Current categories on the site menu will remain the same while content will be updated. Newsletter articles over the last few years will be incorporated. Plans for new and additional information are under consideration. The URL will also remain the same: *www.thedeyofamily.org*

The need to update was further pursued because of the interest and demand for more ways to promote membership, visiting our New Paltz campus during the ebb in pandemic restrictions with new hours of operation, and obtaining correct phone numbers and emails for new and existing members. Social Media platforms provided a source for some of this demand. Queries directed to HHS were transferred to us and vice-versa. Highlights of changes "on the drawing board" include:

More research and contacts need to establish procedures for reporting and submitting this info. Genealogy programs from *Brother's Keeper* to *Ancestry.com* will be updated and possibly incorporated. This research work is time consuming and labor intensive. Voluntary help may be sought. ◆Membership page ideas date back to the August 2021 Annual Meeting when cross-country discussion produced creation of an electronic membership form and ways to make a payment and/or donation directly through the site, and a section on how to become a member.

◆The Events and Happenings page would give dates of upcoming DFA/HHS events such as quarterly DFA Executive Board meetings, annual meetings, an HHS Gathering or Fall Harvest Festival, and lectures via Zoom or YouTube.

◆Historical content tends to seep into many of the above categories. Some overlaps will be addressed to avoid redundancy or whether the repetition is actually a good thing for better understanding.

•Designating a contact person to properly direct inquiries will be another item on the "tweak list" as we prepare for the launch of our revised website coming to a newsletter for you real soon.



HUGUENOT HISTORY Industrial Revolution Innovators

In my previous articles, I have written about the visionary, persevering, and indominable Huguenots in history, including Deyos. I attribute the foresight and fortitude these individuals have had to the ingrained Huguenot faith and diasporic experience. I myself was afforded character-building experiences that have developed a good workethic, dedication, tenacity, and conviction. In my own family, I see a zest for life, travel, adventure, and uncovering the unknown mirrored in those of the stories and legacies of ancestors and other Huguenots. Some of those people include...



John Davison (J.D.) Rockefeller:

J.D. Rockefeller was a business magnate and philanthropist. As gas and electric became new forms of energy, J.D. recognized the potential for crude oil refinement. He, along with two other business partners, opened Standard Oil in Cleveland Ohio (my hometown!). Standard Oil became a monopoly and later was divided into ESSO, BP, Mobil, and Amoco, now well-known petrol companies. Davis & Deyo:

During this time, most households required some type of wagon or carriage. These could be small family carriages to stroll around the community, or large industrial wagons that could transport mercantile goods. Davis & Deyo was one such wagon/carriage manufacturer that created a wide variety of wagons and carriages. Many of the companies existed along the railroad tracks, making the intersectionality of railroads and transportation more accessible. Solomon LeFevre Deyo New York City Subway Chief Engineer

Many people want to do something great with their lives; they want to be remembered. On 27 October 1904, the New York City Subway opened and Solmon LeFevre Deyo became a local household name. Deyo served as chief engineer for the original New York City Subway.¹ He was Chief Engineer until he retired in 1918.² While the Subway system is a great feat, a greater legacy is children and grandchildren.

1. Solomon LeFevre Deyo, Gardiner, Ulster, NY, son of Jonathan Nathaniel Deyo and Maria LeFevre, b. 16 December 1850; d. 1922; m.24 June 1882, Harriet Goodrich Brandon,

Deyo married Harriet Goodrich Brandon on 24 June 1882. She bore him one daughter. Born in New York on 19 May 1895, their daughter was named Harriet Brandon Deyo.

2. Harriet Brandon Deyo, New York, b. 19 May 1895; d. 10 February 1989; m. 30 November 1918, Royce Riker Spring.

Family of Harriet Goodrich Brandon (2) and Royce Riker Spring

On 30 August 1918, the young Harriet's engagement to Royce Riker Spring was announced. She was living with her parents in Norfolk, CT. They were married on 30 November 1918 in Manhattan, NY.³

She was a "prominent member" of the Norfolk community. She was an accomplished horsewoman.⁴ She bred Chesapeake Bay retrievers. During the Second World War, she organized the Red Cross Nurses' Aide Program in Easton, MD. She was also an active member of the Huguenot Historical Society of New Paltz.⁵ She died on 10 February 1989 in Easton, Maryland.

Harriet and Royce had three children: Preston G., Harriet, and Deborah.

3. Preston Gardiner Spring, New York City, NY, b. 27 January 1920; d. 15 May 2012; m. 15 December 1945, Dorthea Jones.

4. Harriet Bradon Spring, New York, b. 5 June 1922; d. 29 July 2018; m. 8 December 1945 John Nisbet Critchlow.

Family of Preston Gardiner Spring (3)

Preston (1920-2012) worked in his family business, R.R. Spring. He enlisted in the US National Guard. He served in the US Army Infantry.⁶ He was a paratrooper in the European Theater, serving mainly with the 82nd Division.⁷ After the War, Preston rejoined the family business until it was sold. He then worked for the Maryland State Highway Administration from 1952 to his retirement in 1982.⁸ His obituary notes he is survived by two sons, two daughters-in-law, two grandsons, and a great grandson.

6. Royce Riker Spring II, b. 19507. Rodney V. R. Spring

Family of Harriet Brandon Spring (4) and John Nisbet Critchlow

Happy, as Harriet was known, earned her degree in early childhood education at Wheelock College in Boston. She and John Critchlow, known as Tom, became engaged then Tom joined the US Navy as a submariner. Tom's submarine sunk in 1943 and he spent over two years as a Japanese prisoner of war. He survived to come home and marry Harriet on 8 December 1945.⁹ Harriet bore Tom two daughters.

Family of Deborah Deyo Spring (5) and Stephen Girard Kent

Deborah was born 23 May 1925 in Talbot County, MD. She graduated St. Mary's in Peekskill. In May 1945 her engagement to Ensign Stephen Girard Kent, who served in the Navy in the Pacific. She died 7 September 1997. They had three children.

11. Stephen Royce Kent, Summit, NJ, b. 15 March 1954; m. Sally R. Searle.

Stephen and Sally were married 23 July 1983 in Bowdoin, Maine.

Katherine graduated Hannah More Academy in Reistertown and from Wellesley College.



This week, the Curatorial Department is pleased to present an oil portrait of Solomon LeFevre Deyo, who served as chief engineer for the original underground New York City Subway line which opened in 1904. The New York Herald stated at the time of Solomon's death in 1922, Solomon's "first railroad work was as a rodman on the Harlem River branch of the New York, New Haven, and Hartford Railroad. Later he was resident engineer in charge of construction from the Harlem River to Pelham Bay. ... Subsequently he became chief engineer of the Interborough Metropolitan Company [which oversaw construction of the subway].'

Born in Gardiner, New York in 1850, Solomon was the son of Jonathan N. Deyo and Maria LeFevre, as well as the older brother of Mary Deyo, who was featured in a recent HHS online exhibit (*https:// www.huguenotstreet.org/exhibits*). After Solomon's death at age 71, he was buried at the New Paltz Rural Cemetery. Deyo Hall on Broadhead Avenue in New Paltz was named in his honor.

The portrait painting in the HHS Permanent Collection, gifted by Solomon's daughter, shows him with a slight smile and warm eyes. Photographs of Solomon at various ages appear in the Haviland-Heidgerd Historical Collection. What do you think of the likeness of the painted portrait?

Valerie Anna Deyo, 92, passed away peacefully at home in Harlingen, TX on January 12, 2021. Valerie was born in San Benito, TX on September 26, 1928 to John D. and Mary Carolina Borello.

After graduating high school, she completed Western Union Training School in Springfield, MO, and returned home to work for the local Western Union office. Later, she was employed as a telephone operator at Southwestern Bell in Harlingen.

While working as a phone operator, Valerie frequently handled calls from Fred Deyo, a young Harlingen businessman. She and Fred met while having lunch at Day's Drug Store and had their first date on Christmas Eve, 1949. The couple married on March 11, 1950. Together, they operated Vannie Tilden Bakery in Harlingen and Brownsville until their retirement in 2002. Valerie also enjoyed caring for her many tropical plants and flowers. In retirement, Valerie met weekly to play Hand and Foot with a group of good friends.

Valerie's feisty Italian spirit, infectious



laugh, compassionate heart, storytelling, and Grandma lessons will be missed by so many. She was a woman of strong principled convictions and work ethic, never wasteful, and a proud American who instilled those values in her family.

Valerie was preceded in death by her devoted husband of 55 years, Fred Deyo; her parents, John and Mary Borello; and her siblings, Mary Moore, Joe Borello, Frank Borello, Lenora Rix, and Julia Conlisk.

THE DEYO (DE JOUX) FAMILY STORY

Your story begins in Europe. In France. The Sires de Iou (De Joux) were powerful "Mountain Lords" and date as far back as 1050 A.D. They lived in a fortress called Chateau de Joux, which is perched on a rocky spur in the Jura Mountains 600 feet above the village of La Cluse-et-Mi-joux at an elevation of 3050 feet. The chateau (or castle) overlooks a valley pass on the French-Swiss border.

The De Jouxs charged a toll to people passing from France into Switzerland. In the 1400s the De Jouxs were considered aristocrats who owned farmland, a castle, the passage from France to Switzerland, and oversaw a little village.

They loved their country and fought for their King who sent them to fight in the Crusades. But around the 1590s trouble began for the De Jouxs. King Louis XIV was an ambitious King and declared that all of France should have one religion - that of Catholicism. This time period was known as The Reformation.



Golf carts in HHS's future--again

The DFA donated two used muchneeded golf cart utility vehicles to HHS in 2001. With proper stewardship, care, and maintenance over the past 20 years, only one has survived the rigors of daily use, but can no longer keep up with the high demands of our 10-acre site.

Loosened pandemic restrictions allow for more personal and family visits to the street. These and other improvements are needed to promote more "boots on the grounds."

Heads up: DFA and HHS will launch a capital campaign to purchase two new electric vehicles: a mid-size utility vehicle for maintenance use and a six-passenger transport for tours and guest convenience—hopefully ready for opening day in early May, 2022.

Considerations include lead-time availability, batteries, necessary options like windshields, canopies, bed lift, freight charges, delivery fees, service contract and maintenance warranty, delivery dates, terms and conditions, and not-for-profit discounts.

Meetings and brainstorming began in December, 2021. Lists were compiled for respective needs of each vehicle. The effect on the environment—thus the need for

noise and fume emissions considerations, new versus used for longevity and fewer repairs, and saving time and the backs of the crew are also serious issues.

HHS will garner support from other family associations as well to make this a corporate and collective fundraiser or capital campaign so it's not a burden to any one particular family association. Total cost of the two new vehicles is in the \$25,000 to \$30,000 range.
